

What & Why Adventists' Believe Spiritual Gifts

- ☑ When Christ ascended to Heaven, He gave gifts to His Church (Eph.4:7,8); and the use of the word "some" when mentioning certain gifts indicates that we do not all receive the same gifts (Eph.4:11).
- ☑ The purpose of these gifts is to equip the Church for ministry and to build it up (Eph.4:12,13).
- ⊠ Whatever gifts are assigned to us, they enable us to perform different functions but in harmony together (Rom.12:3-5).
- \boxtimes Our gifts vary according to God's grace (Rom.12:6-8; *c.f.* Eph.4:7).
- \square The variety of these gifts are administered by the Holy Spirit (1 Cor.12:1,4).
- \boxtimes We do not choose what gifts we have but the Holy Spirit chooses the gifts we receive (1 Cor.12:8-11); and each believer is given at least one gift by which to serve (1 Cor.12:7).
- All spiritual gifts fall into 2 categories: (1) serving gifts, &(2) empowering gifts.
- ⊠ God has appointed ministries and has determined the order of their priority (1 Cor.12:28).
- ☑ The Holy Spirit empowers us to testify effectively for God (Act.1:8). This is evidenced, for example, in the ability and boldness of the disciples following the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost (Act.4:13,31).
- The ministry of Jesus was empowered in the same way (Act.10:38).
- ☑ While it is recognized that the Holy Spirit gifted people during Old Testament times - e.g. with the prophetic gift (1 Sam.10:6, Ezek.37:1) and various other abilities (Exodus 28:3; 31:1-11), He now comes with the added emphasis as Christ's personal Representative, enabling the followers of Jesus to fulfil their calling to fulfill the Gospel commission of Christ (Matt.28:18-20).

The 14 June Memorial Day witnessed the anniversary of the Grenfell Tower disaster in London a year ago, which claimed 72 lives. A silent procession was made in honour of those who perished in that horrific inferno. Many are still waiting to be housed. Pastor Paul King-Brown, Adventist minister of the *London Live Church*, who has been involved with other members of the community, said that there is still work to be done in reaching out to the community.
