It was past noon, and my growing boys were very hungry. Traffic was sparse, and we could not leave the car unattended. We decided that Payop, the oldest boy, would hitchhike to the next town to try to find a water hose that would fit our car. I flagged the first vehicle that appeared.

"What's the trouble?" asked the driver. When we showed him, he opened a box in his truck and pulled out a water hose - exactly what we needed. He put it on; it fitted perfectly! We went on our way,

rejoicing for the miracle hose the Lord had sent. God can send bread by ravens as He did for Elijah, or a water hose by a trucker. He specializes in the impossible.

Baptism of Paraplegic in the Sea

Becoming ill with a rare spinal-cord disease did not stop John getting baptized. Despite being restricted to a wheelchair, his father and a church friend carried him into the sea for the very special ceremony on Monday, 2 September 2019. Adding to the joy of the service, his father also joined him in being baptized at the same time, along with another friend.

How did these three individuals make this decision to commit their lives to Jesus Christ? They are all members of a Bible Study Fellowship that has been meeting for over a year at the Seventh-day Adventist Church community center in Katerini, northern Greece.

As postmodern people, they were attracted to study in a group that is free from the formalisms that are often to be found in an organized church structure. While meeting in this way, they found themselves motivated by love for the Lord and a growing closeness with other members of the fellowship.

They met every Saturday afternoon to engage in Bible study, discussion, raise questions and seek answers while on a common journey of spiritual growth and maturity. This led three of the group to make this choice for Christ.

The baptismal service took place on Katerini beach, where they were joined by friends, including a film maker from a Greek Christian TV channel, *Bible Media TV*, that broadcasted the event. In this way, they officially and publicly gave their hearts to Christ.

Invasion of Love Reconciles Divided Community



War separates - often for years even when the conflict is over and 'peace' is restored. Distrust, hurt and pain have to be overcome. Adventist youth in Bosnia and Herzegovina see themselves as part of that bridge building process.

Joining together from across the country, Adventist volunteers were joined by their willing friends to spend five days in Jajce, a town divided on strict ethnic lines since the Balkan conflict.



While civil authorities work at reconciliation projects, more is needed. For this reason, a church plant in the town is building a grassroots initiative with the help of the youth. Entitled, 'Invasion of love', the project is based on a 'contact hypothesis', a theory which states that people are more inclined to bridge their differences if they are working towards a common goal. For the second year running, the first week of August saw 25 volunteers offer free car washes, paint park benches, clean up areas of the town, and give away free ice-cream and flowers. On the health front, they offered citizens free blood pressure and blood sugar level testing. In addition, they visited with the police, with NGOs working with special needs groups and, on the final day, organized a peace walk.



"We made a great impact in the city and an even greater impact on the participating volunteers," states Božidar Mihajlović, President of the Bosnia and Herzegovina Conference.

Partial funding for the project came from the Trans-European Division (TED) Mission board of Seventh-day Adventists. "I am so excited to see young people working together to make a real difference in their community," states Daniel Duda, who oversees the work of the board.

Part of the rationale for TED support is in seeing the value of Adventist and other youth working together towards a positive community goal, to encourage citizens of Jajce to be proud of their town and community, to build self-esteem, and to assist in a process of reconciliation. Jajce is located in Central Bosnia and Herzegovina with a population of around 30,000 inhabitants. They look forward to a return visit from the youth next year, and to a continued process of growing together.
